
PROJECTED CHANGE IN LABOR FORCE AGE POPULATION




Ongoing Projects & Recent Announcements

Chatham County's Commercial & Industrial Growth



 Chatham County's commercial and industrial sectors saw a significant 24% revenue increase, reflecting strong economic momentum and business expansion.



Vinfast

- Start of production planned for 2028
- Ongoing discussions with Company leadership regarding future plans
- Currently, a vehicle is at CCCC for training purposes



Wolfspeed

- Begun hiring plant employees onsite
- 2,300 construction workers on site
- 2.2 Million SF under roof
- Customized training underway with Central Carolina Community College







Innovative Construction Group



- Locating at the Chatham-Siler City Advanced Manufacturing Site (CAM)
- 157 new jobs, \$39M investment
- Over \$8.3 million in annual payroll at full build out



MetOx International



- Manufacturer's hightemperature superconducting wire, which can make energy transmission up to ten times more efficient than traditional copper cables


ANNUAL INFLATION RATE IN 2.5% TO 3% RANGE, BUT HIGHER THAN 2% GOAL




The Critical Role of Ag

Agriculture and agribusiness industries account for a significant portion of the County's total annual income.

What Ag Looks Like in Chatham

- Average of \$338M annually in cash receipts
 - 1,076 farming operations (95% identified as family farms)
 - Over 1/3 of 1,800+ ag producers identify as female
 - · Chatham's rankings within the state:
 - · 1st in beef cattle production
 - 3rd in sheep and goat production
 - 7th in dairy cattle population
 - 9th in hay production
 - 11th in layers production
 - 14th in broiler production (and steadily rising)
 - Top county in number of native plant nurseries
- Additional \$438M in forestry sector output, supporting 1,377 jobs with annual payroll of \$75M
 - 245,334 acres of private timberland





A Changing Landscape

North Carolina ranks 2nd in the nation in potential agricultural land lost by the year 2040.

Combatting the Irreversible Loss of A Finite Resource

Developmental pressure has increased significantly.

- NC is projected to lose 1.1 million acres of farmland over the next 20 years.
 - Equates to 9,100 farms, nearly 19,600 jobs, and \$1.25B in farm output (American Farmland Trust, 2020)
- In Chatham, under the "Business as Usual" model, we stand to lose 14,700 acres (American Farmland Trust, 2020).
 - This model does not reflect changes from 2017 to current, nor does it include recent megasite development implications.



Benefits of Preserving Ag Land

Why We Need Ag

- Diverse economy and workforce
- Preserve rural character and lifestyle
- Local food production, supply, and access
- Open and green space
- Natural Resource conservation
- Wildlife habitats and corridors
- Carbon sequestration
- Less impervious surface
- Resiliency (both short and long term)
- Lower cost of community services and utilities infrastructure



The Prominence of Ag


The benefits and importance of agriculture are obvious to many residents and stakeholders who provided input to the existing Chatham Farmland Preservation Plan and Plan Chatham.

Supported by the Cost of Community Services Study

Chatham CoCS Study Results:

- For each \$1 of county revenue contributed by residential uses, the county spent \$1.18 to provide necessary community services for those residential land owners.
- For each \$1 of county revenue derived from commercial uses, Chatham County spent \$0.29 for county-provided services.
- For each \$1 of income received by Chatham County for agricultural/forestry uses, the county spent \$0.35 to provide required community services.

Ag lands generate surplus revenues that play an essential role in balancing community budgets.



Our aim is to protect Chatham County agricultural working lands while also addressing the need to help farmers stay in business, both now and for future generations.

Chatham County Agricultural Preservation & Development Trust Fund

- County hired Farmland Preservation Coordinator (Andrew Waters - SWCD) in 2023
- CAPD supported by Article 46 tax revenue and PUV rollback funding
- Agricultural Working Lands Preserved:
 - 6,695 acres in conservation easements
 - 19,061 acres enrolled in Voluntary Agricultural District (VAD) Program




